The rapid rise in the costs of living, notably for food and for energy, means increasing numbers of people need to use the Foodbanks and these are becoming short of donations. #### From the Seven Churches

I'm someone who usually loves an excuse for a party or gathering! Like many, then, I've really missed these things at times over the pandemic. Yet it hasn't just been about missing celebrations. Over the last two years, we have missed so many of the markers of times and seasons in our lives. It may well have felt a little disorientating! Times of celebration and mourning, anniversaries and birthdays, community festivals and gatherings, often kept, but in radically different ways. Some were postponed, reduced in numbers, or moved online. Yet marking such times and seasons remains of great importance in giving shape to our lives and I'm so grateful we can now do this more regularly.

We will soon be reminded again of this importance as we look ahead to a very special weekend in early June. The weekend of Sunday 5 June will see people gather around the country and indeed the world to celebrate the Platinum Jubilee which marks the 70th anniversary of the accession of the Queen and give thanks for her service and dedication as monarch. As churches we will be marking the occasion with a special service in each of our parishes on that Sunday and will then enjoy being part of the many parties in each village that afternoon!

That Sunday will also be another type of anniversary when the church celebrates Pentecost, sometimes known as the 'birthday' of the church. At Pentecost we remember the gift of the Holy Spirit to the disciples gathered in Jerusalem after the resurrection of Jesus. This astonishing gift of God's Spirit, as described in the book of Acts, bound together the early church in worship and shared life, and empowered them to reach out to others in the name of Jesus. As with other anniversaries, it also helps remind the church of its calling and purpose today, as we seek to share the joy and good news of life in the Spirit.

Marking the times and seasons, and being grateful for all that is good in our lives, shapes our humanity. It shapes our sense of purpose, helps us cherish the time we have, and may increase our capacity for joy. It may also, as Pentecost reminds us, draw us more deeply into the life of the Spirit and lead us, in all the seasons of our lives, to praise, prayer and thanksgiving.

## Anne Syfret (6 March 1927 to 25 February 2022)

Anne Syfret lived her early years in Chelsea, then moved to Bermuda at the age of ten, shortly before the start of WW2. She spent the war years in America (Anne's mother was an American) and attended Goucher College in Baltimore, where she studied art history. Her father worked at the US naval base at Key West Florida, where Anne, aged 17, met Teddy Syfret from the Royal Navy, who was passing on his experiences in anti-submarine warfare.

Anne said it was love at first sight. She loved her art studies yet wanted to be with Teddy who had returned to England at the war's end. She showed her lifelong steely determination by fast-tracking her studies to enable her to graduate after two years and then join Teddy, whom she married in St Andrew's Church, Newmarket Road in Cambridge in August 1947.

Teddy became a teacher. After several years in Worcestershire and Surrey, they moved, with three small children – one daughter and two sons – to the village of Hitcham in Suffolk, which became the family home for the next 22 years before they settled in Cambridge, leaving Cross Green House in August 1977, the month when their daughter Sue died in a tragic car accident.

Anne had passionate lifelong interests in illustration, storytelling, writing, needlework, design, model-making, gardening, games, travel, which included speaking French and learning Greek. Not long after Teddy's death in 2008 came the last ten years in Briar Cottage, Great Abington. Anne set to work at once on re-shaping the house, creating a new garden, and turning the derelict barn into a beautiful place for games and entertainment. She most enjoyed village activities such as scrabble and lunch at our local pubs. She pursued an active and creative retirement until the final months of her life, when poor health necessitated a move to a care home. Anne died peacefully on Friday 25 February.

Anne's Thanksgiving service is to be held at Great Abington Church at 1.30pm on Tuesday 17 May. All are welcome.

## County and District Council District and County Councillors' Report April 2022

#### A1307

Progress is being made with the lights at the Hildersham Crossroads and with the extension of the cycle route into the Abingtons. Work is expected to continue for several months yet.

The next project on the list is the roundabout at the Bartlow crossing and the changes to the Dean Road access to the dual carriageway. We do not have a date for this yet, other than to say it will be in this financial year.

#### **Afghan Refugees**

South Cambs. District Council has made available nine homes for Afghan refugees. All are now occupied, and the families are starting to make a new life for themselves. They are being supported by the local authority and funded through government grants.

#### **Ukrainian Refugees**

The District Council is responsible for vetting the homes of sponsors and checking their suitability to receive their guests. They are not offering homes at this stage but may have an obligation later if the accommodation arrangements breakdown and the Ukrainians become homeless.

#### **Covid Funding**

A new discretionary fund has opened to help businesses who have not benefited from previous funding rounds. Full details can be found at <a href="https://www.scambs.gov.uk/CARF">www.scambs.gov.uk/CARF</a>

#### **Bin Collections**

Covid is still making it very challenging to run all the bin collections. As we write over 40 of the workforce of 150 are away. Despite this, it is the council's intention to continue the green bin collection but, if your bin is not collected at the normal time, please leave it out and we will be picking it up as soon as we can.

#### Council Tax Rebate Scheme.

The government's council tax rebate scheme goes live on 1st April. FAQs will be on the district council website. It is aimed at homes in council tax bands A-D. The amount of £150 is not repayable and will not show up on your Council Tax bill.

#### **Fitness and Wellbeing Grants**

South Cambridgeshire District Council is urging instructors to apply for up to £300 to lead fitness and wellbeing activities in their communities. Anyone who leads an existing group or who wants to set up a new initiative in the District, such as leading a walking group in their local park or running a weekly yoga class in a village hall, could be eligible for the small grant. Providers running multiple groups can also apply to fund multiple programmes.

#### **Zero Carbon Communities Grants**

South Cambridgeshire's community groups can now bid for a share of more than £120,000 from the District Council's popular Zero Carbon Communities Grant scheme. The scheme has so far provided £310,000 to 51 grassroots projects that work to tackle climate change in South Cambridgeshire. The deadline to apply for the latest round of grants is Wednesday 1 June 2022. Full eligibility criteria and ideas for projects are available at www.scambs.gov.uk/zerocarbongrant

#### **Zero Carbon Award**

South Cambridgeshire District Council has been recognised for its work to tackle climate change, with a Silver accolade at the 2022 Public Sector Transformation Awards.

## **County Underspend**

Amazingly the County Council has a forecast end of year underspend of £15.7m caused by short term implications of the Covid-19 pandemic. It is intended to use some of this in immediate and visible improvements to county highways including extra work in pothole 'hot spots', an increased programme to reduce surface water in locations highlighted by the community and improving lines and road markings in more rural areas to make driving safer at night and in bad weather.

#### **Family Support**

Although Government-backed schemes set up to help struggling families during the pandemic ended on March 31, Cambridgeshire County Council's Joint Administration has agreed to earmark £3.6m to extend the Holiday Voucher Scheme for a further year.

We will issue each eligible child or young person a £30 supermarket voucher to cover the Easter holiday period. It will be sent by email and/or text to the nominated parent or carer. The voucher does not need to be used in a single shopping trip and once claimed will last for at least a year.

If your child is eligible for income-related free school meals as well as a number of other criteria, they will automatically receive a voucher for the Easter holiday period. Any children who become eligible until 19 April 2022 will also receive a voucher. More at www.cambridgshire.gov.uk.

Shared e-bikes based at Institute. Two bizbike e-bikes are now available for Abington residents to use. You will find them in the lockers on the front terrace of the Institute. Download the free bizbike app, register, and follow the instructions. Fees for rides are very low thanks to a subsidy from the South Cambridgeshire Zero Carbon Communities Fund: 50p per hour. Once you register you will be emailed detailed instructions and an unlock code for the bike lockers. Use the app to scan the QR code at the back of the bike to unlock it, making sure the lock arm is not rubbing against a wheel spoke. At the end of your ride please return your bike to the locker. ## Community Oil Order- urgent appeal for help!

After ten years of ordering oil on our behalf Rod Willcox will be making his **final order** for domestic heating oil, with delivery expected by mid May. He needs customers to tell him their oil requirements between 28 April and 4 May. Orders have been taken for three deliveries per year, usually in January, May and October. Orders are usually submitted to Rod by email and the full list is sent to the chosen supplier online. Phone calls to six suppliers determine the best price available.

With the increasing prices of oil, it makes sense to take advantage of the negotiating power of a bulk community order, often of 40,000 litres, compared with single household orders of less than 2,000 litres. We can only do this if someone will volunteer to take on the task. If you are interested, please contact Rod who will explain what is involved and be prepared to facilitate a smooth handover. #### Abington & Hildersham Women's Institute

Bearing in mind the WI's continuing campaign to take action on climate change, we invited Edward Gildea, an environmental activist, to speak at our April meeting. In 2014 and 2018 he took part in the Clipper Round the World Races from Brisbane to London and Uruguay to Australia and was challenged by the power of the oceans, extreme heat and humidity, hurricanes, and cyclones. He realised how tiny and fragile planet Earth is and how a huge increase in carbon dioxide (35% in 50 years) was affecting the climate and oceans. Hotter oceans mean more drought, wildfires, extreme weather and bio-diversity loss. Thriving Australian coral reefs full of fish had almost disappeared within 5 years. As a climber in the Himalayas, each day he saw rivers turned to torrents by the afternoon due to glacial melt. Huge areas under agriculture are dependent on this water. UK carbon emissions have fallen by 50% since 1990 but China uses coal to manufacture the goods we increasingly import. How can we as individuals help? Be carbon conscious, eat less meat, vote with our purchases, consider our legacy for our grandchildren.

## Community Pharmacist Consultation Service (CPCS) – for treatment of minor illnesses

#### What is CPCS?

When you call us, our receptionists will ask about your symptoms. If your symptoms indicate that you can be helped by a pharmacist, you will be offered a same-day private consultation with a community pharmacist.

Pharmacists are qualified healthcare professionals and experts in medicines. They can offer clinical advice and over-the-counter medicines for all sorts of minor illnesses, and a same day consultation can be arranged quickly and at a time to suit you. This in turns frees up GP appointments for those people with more complex symptoms who really need to see a GP.

#### How does it work?

We will forward your details to the pharmacist, along with details of your minor illness. The pharmacist will contact you to arrange your consultation on the same day, or at a time that suits you. You may be seen in person in a private consulting room if the pharmacist thinks it appropriate, or your consultation may be carried out over the phone or via video. You will be asked about your medical history and symptoms and current medication, in the same way the GP would ask you about them. Usually, the pharmacist will provide you with advice and can recommend an over the counter product if needed. Details of your consultation with them will be sent to us for our records.

If the pharmacist feels you need to be seen by a GP urgently, they will call us to ensure you are seen, or they will advise you to contact the hospital Emergency Department if deemed necessary. You may also be referred back to us to arrange a non-urgent appointment or follow up.

#### Why is this a good thing for patients?

Community pharmacies are local, can be open longer hours than us and can offer you the same consultation outcome at a time that is convenient for you. If the pharmacist thinks you need to see a GP, they can help arrange an urgent appointment for you. Patients who have already used this service liked the convenience of having a consultation on the same day, or a day that suited them, at a pharmacy of their choice.
